I'd also like to take the opportunity to welcome Ed Pennington to his first ever tour, having previously been part of a number of our AGM events. Best of luck to you Ed. It would be remiss not to also say thank you to Andy Davidson for his unrelenting organisation of this year's trip. Like a rabid dog frothing at the mouth, he's gnawed his way through various obstacles to put together what looks like a brilliant trip. The proof of course though will be in the pudding...

So North Somerset here we bloody go, with a few ciders in hand and a few world class golf courses to look forward to. Best of luck to both captains and self-proclaimed returning local "legends", James Robinson and Andy Davidson. TC24 between NWF and The Burnham Badgers promises to be a tightly-fought affair, and I look forward to presenting the trophy to the deserved winning team.

HUNGARY HOARE FEASTS ON UNDERCOOKED RIVALS IN BALA- TON

PALINKA GOLFING ASSOCIATION 7.5

When the idea of a Tanglwyst Cup in Hungary was proposed some years ago - to a group that hadn't ventured further east than Great Yarmouth - it's fair to say it was met with a degree of scepticism. But as the sun set over the Danube, and the trophies were presented, TC23 was logged in the books as one of the finest in it's 13 year history.

It perhaps didn't start that way, as the first arrivals into Budapest set foot in the night one accommodation. Memories of 2017 came flooding back and 6 men were forced to sleep with one eye open. But after a day of vineyards, lake swimming, and BBQ—all was forgotten and the teams were ready to do battle.

The up-market Zala Springs provided the opening day venue on a sweltering day. With humidity through the roof and barely an inch of shade, PGA got things underway, led out for by their local talisman, Laffan, who in partnership with Edwards

would build an early lead that never be relinquished. It would be a similar story in the back group as the formidable pairing of Mullin and Hoare surged to a 4up lead early in the back 9, eventually running out 3&1 victors. And so, with two losses already in the books, the middle match had quickly become a must-win for UnderCooked. After 14 holes, the pairing of King and Jenkins were on track to deliver the vital point to Captain Cooke only to be reeled in by Robinson and Reeve, with Robinson eventually holing an 8-footer for a 1up win on the 18th.

On both previous occasions that a team had suffered an opening day shutout, that team had found themselves 6-0 down after day 2. But at Royal Balaton GC, UnderCooked dared to believe, with each of Cooke's pairings finding themselves up during the final 6 hole stretch of their matches. The top 2 games would eventually end up one-a-piece but with UnderCooked's final paring of Davidson and King 1up and middle of the 18th fairway and PGA's approach hooking violently towards jungle, Cooke chalked up the 4-2 and began to dream of a final day charge. That was until Reeve's ball ricocheted off Cooke's golf buggy — turning a lost ball into a greenside putt, and destroying any remaining shred of composure within Davidson. 4-2 soon became 4.5-1.5 and both sides knew that TC23 was all but over as a contest.

And so it proved. The points were shared on a final day singles at Pannonia GC with Mullin putting the cherry on the cake by recording a second, back-to-back, hattrick and retaining POTY status for another year —the first player to ever do so. But it Hungary that was the real winner, delivering an all-time classic Tanglwyst Cup.

Day 1 – FOURBALLS

Burnham & Berrow GC



Burnham & Berrow Golf Club was founded in 1890 and soon after, they hired a youngster called J.H. Taylor. His task was to be the club's first professional and keeper of the greens. One of the great triumvirates, Taylor went on to win the Open Championship five times.

There is a church in the middle of the course and that in itself is unusual. Consequently, over the years, changes have been made to the layout to ensure that the faithful congregation does not get injured by wayward shots; additionally, some of the blind drives have been designed out.

Burnham is a traditional out-and-back links course and as per Darwin's introduction, taken from his 1910 book, *The Golf*

Courses of the British Isles, Burnham is “ringed round with sandhills”, gigantic ones too. It’s a challenging layout with the tumbling fairways laid out in narrow valleys, protected by deep pot-bunkers and thick rough. The greens are fairly small, requiring precision approach shots and once you are on the putting surface, the fun really begins. Burnham’s undulating, slick greens are amongst the very best in the British Isles.

There are many notable and varied holes at Burnham, with a strong collection of par threes. The first six holes are especially good and the back nine is magnificent. Burnham closes with a classic 18th, one of the best finishing holes in golf, a dogleg left over dunes and an intimidating long second shot across another ridge of dunes towards a green protected by deep threatening pot-bunkers.

Burnham has played host to many important amateur championships over the years and the course is regularly used for Open Championship qualification. A round at Burnham & Berrow is an absolute must for links purists and comparatively good value too for such a quality course in these times of escalating green fees.





Day 2 – GREENSOMES
Weston Super Mare GC

The prolific course architect Tom Dunn was a very busy man during the 1980s, designing layouts at Woking, Sheringham, Royal Wimbledon, Royal Worlington & Newmarket and here at Weston-Super-Mare where his survey report concluded “that on the land situated between the Royal Sanatorium and Slimridge Farm, a Golf Link may be formed second to none in the world. There are a number of natural hazards and the turf throughout is of excellent quality”.

Weston-Super-Mare Golf Club is a seaside course, lying to the south of Weston-Super-Mare Bay, with wonderful views across the Bristol Channel, past Brean Down, Steep Holm and Flat Holm towards Cardiff and the sandy soil of the fairways allows

golfers to use medal tees and normal greens all year round.

The five par threes (at 3, 7, 11, 14 and 17) are all beautifully bunkered short holes (as one might expect from a MacKenzie design, of course) and a trio of par fives complement these one-shot holes, two of which (the 461-yard 8th and 456-yard 13th) are well within birdie range.

“Road Hole,” the 458-yard, par four 15th is the signature hole on the scorecard and it does have similarities with the famous 17th at the Old Course as it begins with a blind tee shot with out of bounds down the right and a fairway that leads to an offset green protected by a treacherous bunker at the front corner.





Day 3 – SINGLES

Enmore Park GC

Saturday 21st September




Located nine miles north of Taunton, on the edge of the Quantock Hills, the course at Enmore Park Golf Club is a 1972 Fred W. Hawtree design. The club was formed in 1906 at nearby Cannington before moving to its current site in 1932, where a 9-hole layout was brought into play. Forty years later, additional land was purchased to allow an expansion to 18 holes.

Today, the course extends to 6,453 yards from the back tees and par is set at 71. A brook and several connecting ponds come into play on five of the holes. Tree-lined fairways are laid out on a compact 100-acre property, with holes on the back nine contained within a front nine that's routed around the perimeter of the property.

Feature holes include the 491-yard 6th, the only par five on the outward half; the long uphill 10th (rated stroke index 1) where birdies are very hard to come by; and the final short hole on the scorecard at the 185-yard 15th, with water lying in wait to the front and right of the green for those who fail to reach the putting surface with their tee shot.

In 2011, the club co-hosted the Boys Amateur Championship with Burnham & Berrow, which Devon's Harrison Greenberry won.



This year Ed Pennington becomes the 19th player to appear in the Tanglwyst Cup Matches over its illustrious 14 year history. But who is Ed? What does this mean to him, and what can his fellow tourists expect? TC24 tour secretary, Andy Davidson, caught up with him shortly before tour to find out.

Q. Describe the emotions as you approach a TC debut?

I am proud and honoured to make my debut at the fourteenth outing of the TC. I have had to admire this from afar / Instagram for thirteen years but excited to finally get inside the ropes. When I pull on The Burnham Badgers jersey on Thursday at Burnham, the nerves will be there, but so will my army of Badgers. In the words of Seve, "When you play for so many, it makes you strong."

Q. What is your finest golfing achievement?

Winning the 2015 TC AGM by 16 stableford points (24 shots gross).

Q. Which pro golfer, past or present, is closest to your golf game?

Shane Lowry. I love links golf, I love Guinness, and I love the glorious game. Like Shane, I gain my shots on the field with my approach play, which makes up for the below average distance I have throughout the bag.



Q. What do you hope to bring to tour off the course?

Go hard and go home. I'm a big fan of starting early and finish-



ing early. The best beers are drunk during or directly following golf. I get very giddy with excitement at the thought of that and fail to pace myself. That said, I am good at pulling the rip cord when I hit peak consumption.

I also like playing a game of pick a year and guess the world top 10 OGWR and major winners. You might want to avoid me if this is not your thing or if you just want to have fun.

Q. If someone is rooming with you on tour, what is most likely to annoy them?

I probably have a gluten intolerance but am not currently interested in addressing it so be prepared for atmospheric disturbances if rooming with me.

Q. Is there anything else you think the lads should know about you?

For reasons mentioned above, come find me if you want an early beer or an early taxi home.

Only once has a team emerged victorious without **ROBINSON** or **HOARE** being on it. **ROBINSON** will have his eyes set on an unprecedented 9th star.

HOARE is also the only player that can catch **ROBINSON** as the all-time leading points scorer, requiring a hattrick against a **ROBINSON** bagel to draw level.



Having won back-to-back hattricks (and 8 of his last 9), **MULLIN** has the opportunity to repeat **COOKE**'s 2018-20 three-peat.



JENKINS is seeking a day 1 victory to end his active losing streak one short of the record of 8. **EDWARDS'** holds that record as well as the winless streak

record but **JENKINS** has until 2028 to avoid breaking the latter—the omens are good too as he's amassed more points in Olympic years (7.5/9) than all other years combined (5.5/27).

Following **GODDERS'** departure, only 3 players have now appeared in all TCs.

DAVIDSON is yet to captain a team to victory, despite two previous attempts.





Following on from a significant improvement in recent years, the players are once again reminded of the necessity to ensure a reasonable pace-of-play during this year's matches. **4 hours should be the maximum length of each round** and we'll be expected to go significantly quicker than that during the foursomes matches.

One player in each group shall oversee the pace of play with a general rule of 3 holes per 40 minutes. Nightly fines will be issued to all players involved in a non-compliant group. The Enforcer will decide on the severity of these fines with a multiplier rule for multiple offences.

Further rules...

1. The Committee is formed of an Honorary President, a Secretary and a Treasurer.
2. The Medicine Man, appointed by the Committee, will be on duty at all times and will always know the best cure for your symptoms.
3. The Enforcer, appointed by the President, will distribute fines and punishments.
4. Recon - the official helper and appointed by the Secretary - is a pivotal role to ensure that everything runs as smoothly as possible. A good Recon will always be thinking one step ahead.
5. The Kitty Man, appointed by the Treasurer, will maintain the kitty and take responsibility for the purchase of beverages. Never refuse to pay the Kitty Man.
6. The Choirboy, appointed by the committee, will be in charge of songs and entertainment.
7. The Peer Mediator, appointed by the Enforcer, will help to resolve disputes and report any crimes to the Enforcer.
8. Mates above all else.
9. Captains' match picks will be handed to the Secretary and

announced on the eve of each round of matches.

- No two team mates shall be paired together for both fourballs and greensomes.
- Tanglwyst matches are played according to the world handicap system. Each player's WGH index must be adjusted for each course's slope rating. Per WGH, 100% handicaps will be used for singles, 90% handicaps for fourballs and the full difference between each pairs' greensomes handicap* will be used for greensomes.
- The R&A rules of golf apply to all matches, including rules regarding lost balls, out-of-bounds, etc.
- Golf apps and range finders are permitted on the course.
- The 'willies out' rule is in operation.
- Player of the year, Clubman of the Year, Yip of the Year and Course of the Year will be decided by a vote following
